Presidents Report

Before any other routine comments, I would like to express my profound sadness to learn that Bruce Wood – N2LIV passed away on October 20, 2012. It was good to see Bruce one last time during the July Picnic. Bruce served the VHF and microwave community as an officer of the NEWS group (and before), as well as Chairman of the Eastern VHF/UHF conference. This has been a rather exciting two months since our last meeting. First we had the joint North East and Mid-Atlantic VHF conference in cooperation with the Pack Rats in the Philadelphia area. I want to especially thank members of the Eastern VHF Conference Committee for an excellent job working with the Pack Rats putting on a great conference. The hotel was a little hard to find, behind some other buildings, but other than that, it was great! I also want to thank all the members who went to Bensalem. PA to attend the joint conference. It was nice to see a good turnout from our area at the joint event. A very nice touch I found particularly helpful was the FOOD at the Friday night swap! I had just driven about 6 hours from the Albany area and was tired and hungry, not wanting to stop along the route. I wasn't sure what to do for supper and, what do you know, FOOD and FLEAS all in the same room! Thanks guys!

The very next weekend I was surprised and pleased to see several NEWS members out in San Jose, CA for the Microwave Update 2012 conference. Paul and Tom gave papers at the conference that were well received. Many interesting topics were covered in the 2 days of presentations. For me, one of the most interesting aspects of the MUD conferences, especially when they are held in the San Francisco, LA, or Dallas area is the opportunity to visit nearby surplus dealers on the day before the conference. This year was no exception with lots of surplus stores on the list provided by the conference hosts. There were actually more stores available than there was time to visit on the day before the conference.

I chose to join a group that visited the "All Phone Company" in Concord, California, Northeast of San Francisco across the bay, beyond Oakland. conference hosts made special arrangements for the company to have a group of hams come shopping that day. The company specializes in used microwave gear taken out of service from point-to-point networks. We wandered through a huge warehouse of microwave gear ranging from 2 GHz to 18 GHz and higher, with lots and lots of equipment on 5.9-6.4 GHz and quite a bit on 10.55-11.7 I personally picked out a pair of 10.55 GHz transmitter-receiver shelves to make into 10.368 transverters. The company gladly agreed to box and ship my stuff by UPS directly to my home for just \$25. That sure beats than hauling an additional suitcase through the

airport and paying a checked baggage fee of \$25 or more to the airline!

Seriously, the Microwave Update conferences are really very good, and if you have never attended one, you should plan to attend especially when they are nearby. Next year, Jeff Kruth at Morehead State University in Morehead, Kentucky will host the Microwave Update conference. Morehead is about 65 miles East of Lexington, KY on I-64. Morehead has a very nice new Space Science Center where they hosted the Southeast VHF conference a couple of years ago. It has a beautiful multimedia presentation hall and a large 21-meter dish on a hill behind the campus. It is a very interesting place to visit and one of just a few schools where students can really get their hands dirty in RF engineering as an undergraduate. They even have an indoor antenna range.

Speaking of exciting events, how did all the members fare with Hurricane Sandy? Did anyone suffer major damage? How about the hams in southern Connecticut or on Long Island? I wonder how K1TEO's antennas fared during the storm. Bring your war stories to the meeting if you can come.

For a presentation this meeting, I have asked Dave – K1WHS to give us an update on the troubles he has recently had with the rock anchors holding the guy wires for his towers. Dave discovered a very interesting (and scary) problem with his tower anchors late this August and September that caused him to miss operating the September VHF contest. If time permits, I plan to have some audio recordings of 903 and 902 MHz noise made at various locations throughout the northeast. It is interesting that the topic of changing our operating frequency from 903.1 to 902.1 MHz also came up at the NEWS–Pack Rats conference without my pushing it. We are not the only ones thinking about moving the standard operating frequency down to the bottom of the band.




